Collectors Cabinet - Hidden Treasure



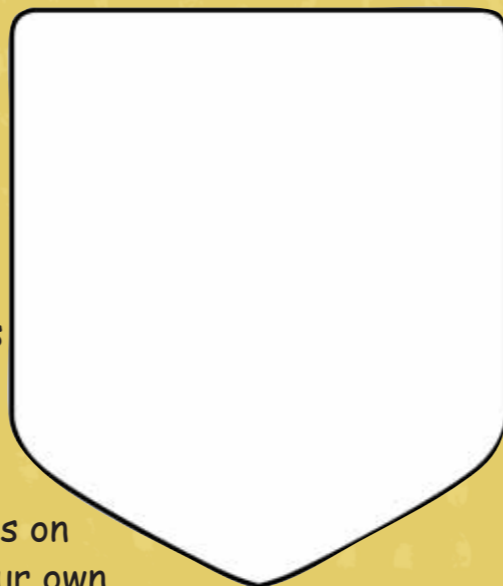
Museums are full of amazing things that people have collected and given to the Museum.

Can you find a 'piano' that would be played with your thumb?

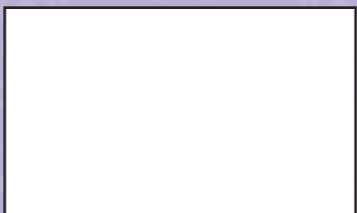
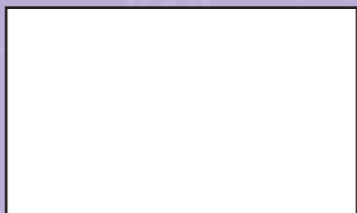
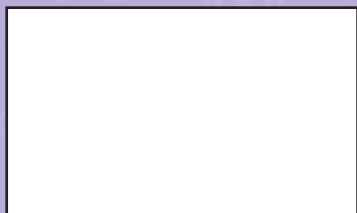

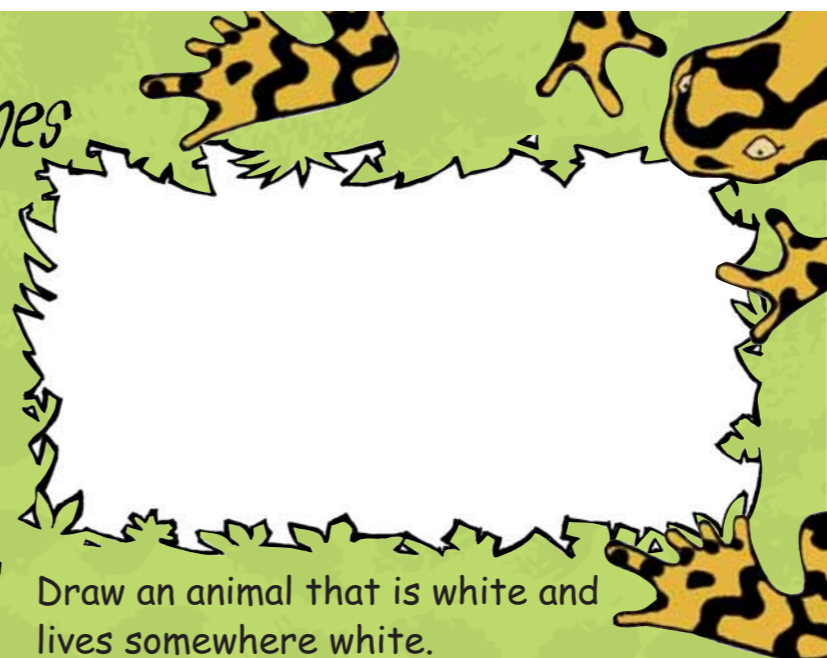
This is the wolf and twin mosaic. Can you believe this was on someone's floor in Roman times! Is your floor at home this amazing?
